CRIMINAL COURT.—Acquittal of Sears.—The trial of Edward Sears, charged with slave-stealing, commenced last Thursday. On the following day the testimony in the case was submitted to the jury, the evidence of Chester English (one of the parties arrested and found on board the schooner Pearl at the time of her capture and imprisoned with Drayton and Sears ever since) being introduced against Sears. On Saturday Mr. MANN addressed the Court in defence of the prisoner. The District Attorney replied, and the case went to the jury in the afternoon, and they, after about half an hour's deliberation, returned a verdict of *not guilty*.
